Refuge Closes Headquarters Area Canoe Trail

The Canoe Trail at the Headquarters Area of the Arthur R. Marshall Loxahatchee National Wildlife Refuge is closed to the public as of Friday, May 21, 2004. The area of closure will extend from the entrance of the canoe trail through the entire 5.5 mile loop. The closure was prompted by an increase of refuge visitor and alligator interactions and the “end of dry season” low water. Canoeists and kayakers will still be able to canoe north and south along the L-40 canal. The closure will be in effect until the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service personnel feel it is safe to open the area. The vast majority of human and alligator interactions are by those alligators that have purposely or inadvertently been fed by humans. Feeding an alligator might seem as if you’re providing it with an easy meal, but you could be causing more harm. An alligator that gets used to being fed associates people with food. It can’t distinguish between “hand-out” and “hand” and may become aggressive toward people when food is not forthcoming.

The refuge is located off U.S. 441/SR 7, two miles south of SR 804 (Boynton Beach Blvd) and three miles north of SR 806 (Delray Beach’s Atlantic Avenue). The refuge is currently open from 6:00 a.m. to 8:30 p.m., seven days a week. Refuge hours change seasonally and are posted at each entrance. The Visitor Center hours are 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. from Wednesday through Friday and from 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on weekends and holidays. The Visitor Center is closed on Christmas Day. An entrance fee of \$5.00 per vehicle or \$1.00 per pedestrian is charged. A variety of annual passes, including a \$12.00 refuge specific annual pass, are available.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is the principal Federal agency responsible for conserving, protecting, and enhancing fish and wildlife and their habitats for the continuing benefit of the American people. The Service manages the 100 million – acre National Wildlife Refuge System comprised of over 540 national wildlife refuges, thousands of small wetlands, and other special management areas. It also operates 66 national fish hatcheries, 64 fish and wildlife management offices, and 78 ecological services field stations. The agency enforces Federal wildlife laws, administers the Endangered Species Act, manages migratory bird populations, restores nationally significant fisheries, conserves and restores wildlife habitat such as wetlands, and helps foreign governments with their conservation efforts. It also oversees the Federal Aid program that distributes hundreds of millions of dollars in excise taxes on fishing and hunting equipment to state fish and wildlife agencies.
